The Narrator stands behind the flag with a penlight in one hand and his reading material in the other. The Den Chief or another Cub Scouts lights each penlight, then steps back to

one side. Lights are turned out.

NARRATOR:

What you see here represents the past, the present, and the future. the stripes of Old Glory stand for the original thirteen colonies. The stars represent the present states. The Cub Scouts represent the men of tomorrow. The four lights remind us of the great Four Freedoms: FREEDOM OF SPEECH, FREEDOM OF WORSHIP, FREEDOM FROM WANT, AND FREEDOM FROM FEAR. Eliminate any one of these freedoms and our world would become darker and colder.

### STANDARD FLAG CEREMONY

Personnel:

Flag bearers and color guards for American flag and Pack flag.(If there is uneven number of color guards, the American flag has precedence and

should have the most guards.)

Equipment:

American flag, Pack flag, flag stands, recorded music if desired.

Setting:

Flag stands are in place at front of room or on stage. Flag bearers and color guards are in position in rear of room. Speaker may be in rear of room or in any convenient place nearby. Cubmaster usually calls the meeting to order and introduces the den who will perform the ceremony. At this time, the speaker advances to the front of the room. (Make certain

he can be heard by everyone)

Speaker:

ATTENTION! WILL THE AUDIENCE PLEASE RISE. COLOR GUARD, PRESENT THE COLORS! (or "Color guard, advance") Speaker's commands should be given loud and clear.

Color guard advances from rear of room with flag bearers in front, followed by guards. The American flag should always be on the marching right in the procession. As procession begins, speaker gives his next command.

Speaker:

<u>HAND SALUTE!</u> (He salutes and audience does likewise) Speaker's eyes should follow the American flag until it is in position in front of the room.

Flag bearers and color guards take position in front of room, near flag stands. They stand at attention, facing the audience. The flags are held vertically.

Speaker:

PLEASE REPEAT THE PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE WITH ME. (He begins Pledge with Audience joining in)

At this point, the Pack flag is lowered slightly and full attention is given to the American flag. Take care neither touches the floor. Flag bearers and color guards do not salute or repeat pledge.

When Pledge is finished, the speaker gives the next command which is the signal for all salutes to be dropped. The pack flag is then raised again to a vertical position.

Speaker:

TWO! COLOR GUARD, POST THE COLORS!

The American flag is placed in its stand; then flag bearer and color guard salute it and step back into place. The Pack flag is then posted; its bearer and guard salute it and step back into place. (The American flag is always posted or raised first, and removed or lowered last.)

Speaker:

<u>COLOR GUARD, DISMISSED!</u> Flag bearers lead procession to back of room, with speaker following last.

For advancement ceremony use Program Helps page 6 DEC, Lighting The Tree Advancement Ceremony.

### TWELVE PHASES OF SCOUTING

STAGING: (twelve days of Christmas) This is a skit for Leaders an/or Parents to put on for the boys. For each phase that person dresses the part.

1st. - continued computer paper, 2nd - person with rope tied all around them, one big mess, 3rd - all kinds of craft material stuck to them, 4th - inter tubes painted yellow and red, person in side of them, 5th - 5 boys all trying to get their attention, 6th - the bigger the spiders the better, 7th - skill awards on cardboard, 8th big merit badges, 9th wash basket over flowing with clothes, 10th - come in looking like you hiked 10 miles, 11th - small piece of canvas over head, you are all wet, 12th come in looking real serious. This works best if boys can not see you until its your turn and each person sings their phase.

In the 7th phase of Scouting my son brought home to me 7 Skill Awards, 6 silly spiders, 5 Cub Scouts, 4 colored beads, 3 arts and crafts, 2 knots to tie, and an application for den 3.

In the 8th phase of Scouting my son brought home to me 8 merit badges, 7 skill awards, 6 silly spiders, 5 Cub Scouts, 4 colored beads, 3 arts and crafts, 2 knots to tie, and an application for den 3.

Den Leader: Who else can believe that right is right and wrong is wrong, and the good guy always wins in the end?



Scraps of green medium size rick-rack Yarn Cotton





Cut orange chenille stick in half and bend each half into antler shape. Glue one into each small hole.

Cut 4" pieces of red and green chenille stick.

Center bell on one of the pieces, then twist



### ADVANCEMENT CEREMONY

Personnel: Cubmaster:; den chief

Equipment: Racetrack board with cutouts of racing car, red trophy pennant, and green, white, and checkered flags; cellophane to color flags; flashlight for Cubmaster or the other narrator; badges pinned on small cutouts (racing car for Bobcats, appropriate flags for Wolf, Webelos, and Arrow of Light, and red trophy pennant for Bear).

Setting: Room is darkened. Den chief stands with flashlight behind cutouts. At the appropriate time, he illuminates cutout. Cubmaster or other narrator, using flashlight, reads script.

Cubmaster: In an auto race, drivers must advance in position. Tonight we have a special way to honor our racing drivers who have advanced in their Cub Scout rank.

Cubmaster: The first step in any race is to establish a qualifying time. Tonight we have some new bobcats who have qualified as drivers on our Cub Scout advancement track (den chief holds flashlight behind racing car

cutout. Cubmaster continues with a regular bobcat induction ceremony.)

#### Wolf

Cubmaster: The green flag symbolizes those drivers who have qualified for a wolf position on our advancement track. Will the following Cub Scouts come forward to receive their Wolf badges (or arrow points) and green flags. (Den chief illuminates green flag cutout with flashlight. Cubmaster reads names of Cub Scouts.)

Because your parents were cheering for you and helping you, we would like them to come forward and present the badge to you.

### Bear

Cubmaster: The trophy pennant indicates that a driver is more experienced and skillful in handing his car and is moving up among the track leaders. Will the following Cub Scout please come forward to receive their Bear Badges (or arrow points) and red trophy pennants. (Den chief illuminates red trophy pennant. Cubmaster reads names of boys.)

Just as pit mechanics help drivers to refuel and change parts, so your parents have helped you. Will the parents come forward to share in your honor. (parents present badges.)

#### Webelos

Cubmaster: The white flag tells us that the driver has but one lap to go to reach the checkered flag - Webelos rank. He has learned to manage the turns, jams, and upsets.

Will the following please come forward to receive their Webelos badge (activities pins) and white flags which show that they are on the last lap of the advancement track. (den chief illuminates white flag. Cubmaster reads names.)

Many a driver wins because of the support given by his pit crew. Your parents helped you achieve your new rank. I know they will be proud to come forward now and share in this honor by presenting these badges to you (parents present badges.)

### Arrow of Light

Cubmaster: The checkered flag announces the end of the race. It shows that the driver has reached the goal and has won the right to go on to bigger tracks - the Indianapolis 500 - which is Boy Scouting. Will the following boys come forward for our highest track award the Arrow of Light and their checkered flags (den chief holds flashlight behind checkered flag. Cubmaster reads names.)

Boys, your parents have helped you to be square and game, and since they traveled this track to Arrow of Light with you, we would like them to come forward now and present the Arrow of Light to you (parents present badges.)

### PINEWOOD DERBY SONG

(Tune: Camptown Races)

Cub Scouts all join in the song, Doo-dah, doo-dah! Pine car track is mighty long, Oh, doo-dah day!

#### Chorus:

Going to run so fast, Going to get ahead. Bet my money on a blue pine car, Somebody bet on the red.

Red cars, blue cars, green and gray, Doo-dah, doo-dah Running on the track today, Oh, doo-dah day!

They're the pride of all the lads, Doo-dah, doo-dah! Built by Cub Scouts, moms, and dads, Oh, doo-dah day!

### GAME AUTO RACE

Arrange Cub Scouts in a circle, with the den chief in the center. He gives each player the name of an automobile, being sure to use the same name more than once so that several players have the same car. To start play, the den chief then calls out the name of an auto. The first player with that car name to touch him and return to his place wins the race. The game continues as the den chief calls out another auto.

### THE BUS TRIP

SCENE: Players sit on chairs arranged as bus seats. One Cub is the driver who sits in front and turns an imaginary steering wheel.

- 1. The driver announces that they are about to take a sightseeing trip. The players ad lib eager remarks, such as sounds like fun, etc.
- 2. The trip starts. The players peer out of the imaginary windows and remark, one at a time, about the interesting scenery.
- 3. The driver calls, "Hang on, we're going up a steep hill." The players lean back. When the driver announces that they are going downhill, the players lean forward.
- 4. The driver says that they are passing the Grand Canyon of Arizona, then a few seconds later that they are now crossing the Hudson River into New York. Someone says: "I don't even remember crossing the Mississippi." The driver boasts, "Fast trip!"
- 5. The passengers grow quiet, and finally drop their heads in sleep. As the driver calls, "Lunch time", they jerk upright and scramble off the bus.
- 6. After eating a few moments, the driver suggests that they look around. As they do so, someone calls out, "look .... an African lion! But how could we be in Africa?" The driver looks at an imaginary map, shrugs and remarks: "wrong road."
- 7. As they resume trip, driver calls "Hang on! Bumpy road ahead." The passengers bounce up and down.
- 8. Driver announces they are passing through the desert. Players wipe brows and loosen collars. When driver announces they are in mountains, passengers huddle and button up collars.
- 9. Driver calls: "Home again." Everyone gets off bus walk to wings, looking around, in surprise. Someone says: "Is our home in China?"

### **CHEERS**

<u>JET PLANE</u> Swish your hands across in front of you like a jet and clap your hands twice, real fast.

<u>LOCOMOTIVE</u>: Begin by slapping your left arm slowly with your right hand. gradually increase speed, working down over the left palm, peering into distance. Imitate train whistle - "WHOO - WHOO".

**BALOO AND GOLD** 

### SPIRIT OF LORD BADEN-POWELL

The Narrator. the "Spirit of Lord Baden-Powell" is a Den Leader in full uniform, wearing a campaign hat. They read the entire script from a lectern.

NARRATOR: I represent the spirit of Lord Baden-Powell, the founder of Boy Scouting. I am also the spirit of Scouting past and present. Here is our future, Cub Scouts of America.

(First Cub Scout enters carrying toy church or Bible.)

NARRATOR: we take turns praying in our dens. I like to wear my uniform to church on Scout Sunday. Nearly half of all Cub Scout Packs in America are sponsored by churches.

(Second Cub Scout approaches in complete Cub Scout uniform .)

NARRATOR: The two colors of the Cub Scout uniform have a meaning. Blue stands for truth and loyalty; gold for good cheer and happiness.

(Third Cub Scout enters carrying Wolf Cub Scout book and Kipling's "The Jungle Book".)

NARRATOR: Early Cub Scout Ceremonies were base on Kipling's Jungle tales. When Cub Scouting was organized in America in 1929, Indian themes were used.

(Fourth Cub Scout enters with a craft project of wood.)

NARRATOR: Cubbing means fun. We have lots of fun. But we like making things, real boy projects, things we can play with or that follow our theme.

(Fifth Cub Scout carries in nature collection)

NARRATOR: I like to go on hikes and collect things for my nature collection or the den museum.

(Sixth Cub Scout enters with a "bubby" burner,)

NARRATOR: I like to go on picnics. We Cubs sure do like to eat. This is the cook stove I made.

(Seventh Cub Scout, the smallest boy, enters with American flag.)

NARRATOR: I am proud to be an American so I can salute our flag. I also like to see our Pack flag because then I know I am part of 88 years of Scouting. I belong. Yes, I represent the past and present years of Scouting. I belong. Yes, I represent the past and the present. These boys, Cub Scouts now, are the men of tomorrow. They will be preservers of American heritage. Please stand and join us in singing "God Bless America".

### **AKELA'S LIFE STORY**

(advancement ceremony)

Equipment: Ceremony board or log with three small candles and one large candle; tomtom; artificial council fire.

Setting: Tom-tom beats. Akela enters and walks behind the fire. Akela gives the Cub Scout sign and tom-tom beating stops.

Narrator: Akela was the big Chief of the Webelos tribe; tall, stalwart, straight as an arrow, swift as an antelope, brave as a lion - he was fierce to an enemy but kind to a brother. Many trophies in his teepee.

His father was the son of the great yellow sun in the sky. He was called the "Arrow of Light". His mother, from whom he learned those wondrous things that mothers know, was called "Kind Eyes".

His father helped him make a little bow and arrow and once, when an enemy would have tomahawked his mother, he, Akela, from his papoose basket shot the pursuing enemy in the eye, and his mother escaped. A little later, he began to understand the signs and calls of the Webelos tribe. Then he was taken on little trips into the forest among the great trees and streams. Here, from the wolf, he learned the language of the ground; the tracks and ways to food.

(At this point, Akela lights the large candle representing the "Spirit of Akela" and using that, lights the small wolf candle.)

Akela: With this candle, representing the "Spirit of Akela", we light the trail of the Wolf. From the signs along the Wolf trail, I see that the following braves are ready for advancement in the "Wolf Clan" of Akela's tribe. (Akela calls names of boys receiving /wolf badge and arrow points. They came forward and stand before council fire. Akela Presents their awards).

Narrator: Then from the big, kindly bears, he learned the secret names of the trees, the call of birds - the language of the air.

Akela: (Lighting Bear candle) With the "Spirit of Akela" we light the bear trail. From the signs along the Bear Trail. I see that the following braves are ready for advancement in the "Bear Clan" of the Akela's tribe. (He calls forward boys who are receiving Bear badges and arrow points).

Narrator: But before he could become a scouting "brave" on his on his own, he had to prove himself by trying out new skills, performing certain tasks and passing tests of accomplishment.

### AKELA'S LIFE STORY (adavancement ceremony con't)

Akela: (Lighting Webelos candle) With the "Spirit of Akela" we light the trail of the Webelos. From the signs along the Webelos trail, I see that the following braves have shown their skill in the Webelos Clan of Akela's tribe. (He call names of boys receiving activity badges, and indicates which badges they earned).

Narrator: Then, Akela was required to pass the highest test of all. He must prove himself qualified to wear his father's name "Arrow of Light"

Akela: From the signs further on down the Webelos trail, I see that the following brave have proven themselves worthy to wear the "Arrow of Light", the highest award in Akela's tribe. (He calls forward boys who have earned the Arrow of Light Award) (upon presenting these awards, the tom-tom begins to beat again at a rapid pace) (Drum stop)

Akela: From the four winds, Akela hears that you braves are doing well along the trails that will lead you into Boy Scouting. Now will all Cub Scouts stand and repeat with me the Cub Scout Promise.

### **CLOSING**

Equipment: Flashlight, four candles.

Personnel: Four readers

The room is completely darkened except for the flashlight held by first reader. He passes it on to the next reader, Etc.

1st Reader: "In 1907, when Lord Baden-Powell conducted an experimental camp for boys on Brownsea Island in England, the Scouting movement began as a tiny spark of light." (light 1st candle)

2nd Reader: "On Feb. 8, 1910, then Boy Scouts of America was born when William B. Joyce filed incorporation papers in Washington, D.C." (lights 2nd candle from 1st)

3rd Reader: "On June 1916, The Boy Scouts of America was granted a Federal Charter by Congress. This was also the year when Baden-Powell introduced Wolf Cubbing in Europe. Fourteen years later, Cub Scouting began officially in the United States." (light 3rd candle from 2nd.)

4th Reader: "Just as the light in this room has grown as it was passed from one candle to another, so did the Scouting movement it is the largest youth organization in the world, with more than 13 million members in 110 countries. "let us take this light and let it spread outward to others."

### ARROW PRESENTATION

( Have an arrow painted gold for each boy who is receiving his Webelos badge)

Cubmaster: The arrow has always been a symbol in Cub Scouting. It is part of the heritage from the American Indian. A symbol of determination and power. The arrow is straight and narrow like the only path for a Cub Scout. The crooked path like a crooked arrow will never reach its mark.

Webelos Leader: The arrow like the space ships of tomorrow are symbols of opportunity and potential. The arrow for those that are willing to work represents fun and adventure while space travel offers an unlimited potential.

Cubmaster: Tonight we have several young astronauts of tomorrow that are well on the cosmos way of adventure towards the Arrow of Light award. Will the following Webelos and their parents please come forward and stand by your Webelos Den Leader\_\_\_\_\_.

Cubmaster: Webelos, tonight we are presenting to you and your parents a symbolic arrow. This arrow represents a goal, the Arrow of Light award. This joint presentation means it requires effort from both of you. As the challenges of Webelos becomes harder to overcome, let this Arrow and what it represents give you the strength and knowledge to overcome them and reach the goal of the Arrow of Light. Parents into your custody we present your son's arrow to be brought back as a symbol of accomplishment and part of his Arrow of light ceremony in the future. Congratulations.

### **CHEERS**

BOW AND ARROW: Make motion as if drawing arrow from quiver on back, put

it in bow, pull string and say "zing". Do this from start 3

times.

WOLF: Give a Wolf howl four times, each time turning one -

quarter of a turn to make one full turn.

BEAR: Growl like a bear and turn one-half a turn each time. Make

four growls and two complete turns.

CUBBY: Leaders yells: "What's the best den?", and all the dens

answer with their own den number.

### ARROW OF LIGHT CEREMONY

Staging: Arrow of Light Ceremonial Board with seven candles. Parents bring gold arrow with them when they are called up.

Cubmaster:	Will the following Webelos Scouts and their parents please come
	forward,

The arrow you have brought with you tonight is now part of your Scouting experience. It represents the straight and narrow path with its many tasks and challenges to your final Cub Scouting goal, the Arrow of Light.

Asst. Cubmaster: While working towards the Arrow of Light this symbolic arrow was there to remind you of your goal. Now that your goal is accomplished it represents not the accomplishment but it is a symbol of the stride, determination and challenges that were met along the way.

Cubmaster: (Pointing to the Arrow of Light Ceremonial Board) "Webelos Scouts, the emblem you see before your represents the Arrow of Light award." "You have completed the four ranks of Cub Scouting - Bobcat, Wolf, Bear, and Webelos - and now have successfully completed the requirements for the Arrow of Light Award. This is the highest rank in Cub Scouting."

Asst. Cubmaster: "The seven candles represent the rays in the Arrow of Light. As they are lighted now, you will hear how they stand for the seven great virtues of life.

(Cubmaster and Asst. Cubmaster take turns)

- 1. WISDOM Wisdom does not necessarily mean superior knowledge. It means putting to the right use the knowledge that one possesses.
- 2. COURAGE Courage is not the quality that enables men to meet danger without fear, it is being able to meet danger in spite of one's fear.
- 3. SELF CONTROL Self control isn't limited to the control of one's temper, but control of one's self in all things; eating, playing, and even working and talking.
- 4. JUSTICE Justice is the practice of dealing fairly with others withou prejudice or regard to race, color, or creed.
- 5. FAITH Faith is the conviction that something unproved by Physical evidence is true. One 8 year old Cub Scout said faith was when you turned the light switch - you knew the light would go on.

### ARROW OF LIGHT CEREMONY CON'T

- 6. HOPE Hope means to expect with confidence. Always Hope for better things to come. A man without hope is of little good to himself or his community.
- 7. LOVE There are many kinds of Love Love of family, Love of home, Love of fellowman, Love of God, and Love of country. All these Loves are necessary for a full life.

Asst. Cubmaster: If you live by the seven great virtues you will become a happy man, and a happy man is a successful man.

Cubmaster: It is now my pleasure to present you and your parents with your Arrow of Light Award.

Wear this proudly as this is the only Cub Scout rank you will be allowed to wear on your boy Scout uniform. You may also wear it on your uniform if you become an adult Scout leader someday.

"CONGRATULATIONS!"

### WEBELOS GRADUATION

STAGING: A bridge on stage with the Cubmaster on one end and a Scoutmaster on the other end. Lights dimmed, candles and rank posters displayed.

CUBMASTER: Will the Webelos Leader please escort your Webelos and Parents, who have indicated that they are ready and willing to graduate into Boy Scouts, up front to the foot of the graduation bridge, the bridge that connects Cub Scouting to Boy Scouting. (Pause) Webelos, this is the final step in Cub Scouting as a boy and soon the first step in Boy Scouting as a young man.

ASST. CUBMASTER: I know I can speak for our pack and its leadership that we are indeed proud of your accomplishments over the past year. Your Webelos leader has guided and taught you as well as learned from you over the past year. Only your parents can be more proud of you than these leaders.

can be more productor you than those reasons.
CUBMASTER: We, the leaders of Pack wish you luck and success on this new trail of Scouting. I am sure that if you put as much time and effort in the days ahead as it the days past, you will be successful no matter what you do, in Scouting or in any other part of your life.
ASST.: CUBMASTER: Will the parents of the graduating Webelos please take your place by Mr, the Scoutmaster of Troop (As each Webelos name is called the Webelos Leader will escort his Webelos to the bridge to Boy Scouting) The Webelos Leader will remove his Webelos neckerchief - award him his Graduation certificate. Each Webelos in turn will step up on the bridge, take three steps to the midd of the bridge, salute the new Scoutmaster, and continue across the bridge. While this is happening, the Cubmaster may read aloud the Scout oath in three parts as each Webelos crossed over.
(The Scout Law may be read in parts too, depending on number of boys.)

SCOUTMASTER: (Give the Scout handshake to each graduating Scout, welcomes him to the troop and places the troop neckerchief on his neck. After all the scouts have crossed over and been welcomed.) Scouts, we are happy to welcome you to our troop. I can see by the Arrow of Light that you are prepared to join the great fellowship of Scouting. As a Scout you will be given many opportunities for learning, leading, and having fun. We only ask that you try your best. Please repeat after me the Scout oath. (Scouts repeat the oath.) Parents - welcome to our troop. I congratulate you on the fine work that you have done with your son in Cub Scouting. I am sure you will find new adventures in our troop.

### **BLUE AND GOLD BANQUET GRACES**

The invocation or grace for the Blue and Gold banquet should be conducive to reverence. It should not offend anyone's religious beliefs. Here are a few suggested graces:

Bless us, O Lord, and these Your gifts Which we are about to receive from your Bounty. Amen.

We give You thanks, Almighty God, for all your benefits. Bless this food to the nourishment of our bodies and our lives to Your service. Amen.

in circle around Akela.

Narrator; Kipling's jungle stories as adapted by Lord Baden-Powell of England, who

started the Scout movement, have been made the basis of the Cub Scout program in 65 different countries. We have taken our skit from Rudyard Kipling's The Jungle Book. As our scene opens, Mowgli, the man cub, has been brought before the pack council. Shere Kahn, the vicious tiger, wants to kill the cub, but Mother Wolf wants to keep the cub as her own.

Akela, the great lone Wolf who leads the pack, arises from his rock.

AKELA; Ye know the law -- ye know the law. Look well, oh wolves.

Mother Wolf, Look, look well, oh wolves. (enter Shere Kahn from right.)

Shere Kahn, He is mine! Give him to me!

Narrator: Now the law of the jungle lays down that, if there is any dispute as to the

Akela; Who speaks for this cub?

Narrator; The only outside creature who is allowed at the wolf pack council is

Baloo, the brown bear, who teaches the wolf cub the law of the jungle.

(Enter Baloo from left)

Baloo; I speak for the man cub. There is no harm in him. Let him run with the

pack. I myself will teach him.

Akela; Baloo has spoken and he is our teacher for the young cubs. Who speaks

besides Baloo?

Narrator; A shadow drops into the circle. It is Bagheera, the king of the jungle and

nobody cares to cross his path. (enter Bagheera from left).

Bagheera; To kill a small cub is shame! To Baloo's words, I shall add my strength and

help this small cub.

Narrator: And this is how Mowgli joined the Seeonee Wolf Pack.



#### **GAMES**

#### **FISHTAIL**

Description of Game: Players form up in single file - each one grasping the waist of the player ahead.

The last player has a fishtail tucked into the back of his belt (A neckerchief works well)

The fishes head tries to maneuver so that he can snatch the tail while the player with the tail tries to prevent it.

After a few minutes, another two players change places with the head and tail.

Caution: Make sure that the area is clear of obstructions.


#### WEATHER ROCK

Most of Southeast Asia celebrates the Solar New Year by one name or another. Most of the festivals involve water since this is the hottest time of the year in these countries. The water that is thrown by the bucketful at everybody is intended to bless them and to wash off the troubles of the old year.

There are many other New Year's rituals to be observed, also. Houses are cleaned, new fires are kindled, old wrongs are righted, new clothes are worn, gifts are exchanged, and special foods are prepared and eaten. The images of Buddha in the temples are ceremonially washed with a mixture of perfumed water and flower petals.

Outside of Southeast Asia, people from each of these countries adapt their celebrations to new conditions. Most of them gather in public places like colleges and community recreation centers where there will be room for everybody. Their main purpose in celebrating the New Year is to pass on their culture to their children. A secondary, but still important purpose, is to refresh themselves with a breath of home in a strange land. Adults and children alike are mesmerized by the dances, the music, and the smells of traditional foods.

## Making It Work

Check newspapers (or ask students to check) for announcements of Solar New Year celebrations in your area. Remember, there may be variations in the spelling of the names of these festivals in the newspapers. Keep parents informed by sending home a class newsletter with this kind of information.

Ask students to share with the class first-hand reports of celebrations they attend. Where was the festival they attended? Which ethnic, national, or religious group put it on? Did they attend as a family? What did they see? Hear? Do? Eat?

## Making a Japanese Carp Kite


#### Materials:

- colored paper


- crepe paper for streamers


2. Cut a dozen streamers from crepe paper. Glue or staple them to the open end of the cup.

4. Cut four 12" pieces of string, and make a knot in one end of each. Pull the strings through the four holes in the cup from the inside out. Tie the four ends together to make the kite's bridle. Attach a longer string to the bridle to hold.

- #3: The mud itself, with food stores vast, from life that grew in ages past.
- #4: It's not all nature mud reveals: here's a candy wrapper and two toy wheels.
- #5: There's something moving what's that now? I'll pick it up a bee YOW!
- #6: Quick, here's some mud to put upon the spot, to take away the soreness hot.
- NARRATOR: In mud there are stones and living things: healing power for bitter stings. through it flows the earth's life blood. Our soil in the neighborhood is really MAGIC MUD.



#### PONY EXPRESS TRAIL

(Advancement Ceremony)

Props: Long rope with Bobcat, Wolf, Bear, and Webelos stations laid out at appropriate points on the rope. Tom-tom, Electric campfire, Spotlight if lights are out. . In tonight's ceremony CUBMASTER: This month's theme is all Cub Scouts will pretend to be Pony Express riders and parent will be Station Attendants. (Den Chief beats tom-tom to rhythm of a galloping horse.) ASST. CUBMASTER: Will all pony express riders gather around the campfire. It is time for us to take council. CUBMASTER: The bobcat is starting the trail of scouting as he learns the ideals of Cub Scouting - the Cub Scout motto as well as the sign, the handclasp and the salute. It's a long trail ahead to the Eagle rank, but this is the beginning. Just as the pony express rider started his long ride, so our new Bobcats are starting out tonight. Will the following boys line up at t he starting gate on the pony express trial? (Advancement Chairperson reads off the names of boys who are ready for their Bobcat rank. Den Chief beats tom-tom lightly as boys go to starting gate.) ASST. CUBMASTER: When the Bobcat requirements are accomplished, the young Bobcat is ready to begin his journey along the pony express trail of Scouting where each achievement is a milepost. There are 12 mileposts between each station. CUBMASTER: Just as the pony express rider galloped along the trail defying the dangers and hazards of the wilderness from one station to the next, so the young Bobcat express rider begins his gallop along the trail to Wolf Valley Station. Advancement Chairperson: Tonight we have (boy's names) who have galloped the 12 miles to Wolf Valley Station. (Den Chief beats tom-tom lightly.) Advancement Chairperson: (boy's names) Have galloped another 12 miles to Bear Ridge Station. Will these boys please go to Bear Ridge Station. (Den Chief beats tom-tom lightly.) Advancement Chairperson: (Boy's names) have made the long trip to Webelos Lodge

Station. Will these boys please go to that station.

#### PONY EXPRESS TRAIL CON'T

(Den Chief beats tom-tom lightly.)

CUBMASTER: Will the station attendants (parents) of these brave riders please come forward so that they may receive the awards to present to their boys.

(Awards are presented at each station, in turn, by Advancement Chairperson while the Asst. Cubmaster reads awards: Bobcat, Wolf, Bear )

ASST. CUBMASTER: In addition to the 12 mileposts between stations (Boy's names) have scouted (number of miles - arrow points) - elective mile posts above and beyond the call of duty.

(Advancement Chairperson awards arrow points. After all other awards are presented the Webelos Induction and Presentation Ceremony takes place.)

CUBMASTER: This station represents the plateau of Cub Scouting. These boys have been on the trail under the guidance of a Den Leader. the Webelos Scout is instructed in, and learns the requirements which enable him to continue his journey up the trail into Boy Scouting.

(Advancement Chairperson presents Webelos Award to parents to pin on their sons.)

CUBMASTER: I would like to congratulate all these fine riders and station attendants for advancing along the pony express trail. As you learn, you advance; and as you advance, you grow.

#### **GAMES**

WHAT PIONEER AM I? Pin the name of an American Pioneer on the back of each player. (He does not see the name.) In turn, each player tries to guess his pioneer. (the others give him hints until he guesses correctly.)

HUNT THE COON. Any small object, such as a block or small animal, may be used as the coon. All cover their eyes and "No Fair Peeking" while the man who is "it" hides the object somewhere in the room where it is in plain sight but not readily seen. Then he says "Hunt the Coon" and all begin the search. As soon as a player sees the coon he says nothing, but quietly sits down. One by one the players will sit down until only one is left.

#### **CITY SLICKERS**

Cast: Ma, Pa, Boy, Sis, all dressed as hillbillies. Two boys dressed as city slickers.

MA: (Comes out of cabin) Howdy! What Ya'll want?

Driver: How do we get to Tulsa?

Ma: Well... I don't rightly know, but I'll ask my son. (Yells into cabin)
Sonny, How do ya'll get to
Tulsey?

Boy: (comes out) Well, Ma. I don't rightly know. I'll ask Sis. (Yells into cabin) Sis, how do ya'll get to Tulsey?

Sis: (comes out) I don't rightly know. I'll ask Pa. (Yells) Pa, how do ya'll get to Tulsey?

# TRAILS, TREKS, AND TRACKS

## THE CUB SCOUT TRAIL (AN OPENING CEREMONY)

PROPS: The only thing needed for the ceremony is a poster showing a mountain, on which there has been drawn a distinct trail. Have the boys in your den draw this poster as one of their projects. As each Cub says his part, he places the proper Cub Scout sticker (available at the scout office) in place along the trail.

As each Cub comes on-stage and says his part, he places the sticker or badge in a specific place along the Cub Scout Trail.

CUB #1: I am a BOBCAT - a beginner on the Cub Scout trail. Once, I pass my Bobcat requirements, I'll be on my way.

CUB #2: I am now a Wolf Cub along the Cub Scout trail. I've earned my badge and arrow points and am ready to go another step of the way.

CUB #3: A Bear Cub Scout I have become. I'm in my second year. Up, up the Cub Scout trail I go -- soon to be a Webelos.

CUB #4: Webelos is the name for me. I spend my time earning Activity badges, but there's still one more step for me. (Also places the Webelos colors higher on the trail.)

I, too, am a Webelos, but I have reached the top. I've earned the Arrow of Light Award (places the badge or sticker on the top if the mountain), but I have one more step. By earning my Arrow of Light, I've studied quite a bit about Scouts. Now I can't wait to become one. (He puts on a Boy Scout hat.)

#### "PUZZLE" ADVANCEMENT CEREMONY

Equipment:

"Puzzle" Ceremonial Board shown; easel board

Personnel:

Cubmaster, Webelos den leaders, advancing cub Scouts and their parents

Call forward all boys who are to receive awards, with their parents.

Cubmaster:

In a way, our pack is like this jigsaw puzzle we have on the table. The pack has many pieces - boys and parents - who work together to make the pack go and grow. As we present our advancement awards tonight, we will see how we work together to make the big picture of our pack and of Cub Scouting.

(Cubmaster and Webelos den leaders give the advancing boys their piece of the puzzle; each piece has the boy's awards taped to it. The parents remove the award and pin them on their son's shirt, boys and parents then work together to complete the puzzle.)

Cubmaster:

There, the puzzle is finished. each Cub Scout and parent contributed to make the big picture. That is the story of our pack - people working together.

#### **CHEERS**

FREIGHT TRAIN: This applause simulates a freight train in the distance, approaching the station, and then fading off again. Use a four-beat hand clap with the first beat of each grouping of four loud and then the following three softer beats. The train can speed up, slow down, stop, start, with varying tempo. Throw in a few train whistles for sound effect.

<u>Locomotive</u>: Begin by slapping your left arm slowly with your right hand. Gradually increase speed, working down over the left palm peering into distance. Imitate train whistle - "Whoo - Whoo"

#### CUB SCOUT AND PARENT PROMISE CEREMONY FOR GRADUATING TIGER CUBS

(For inducting Tiger Cubs and their adult partners into the pack)

**EQUIPMENT:** 

Certificate of Graduation, Tiger Cub one-year pin.

PERSONNEL:

Tiger Cubs group coach, narrator, Cubmaster, graduating Tiger Cubs and the partners. The Tiger Cubs group coach escorts the

boys and adult partners to the ceremonial area.

NARRATOR:

"Today these Tiger Cubs and their partners are taking their first big step on the Cub Scouting trail. Will the Tiger Cub coach please present the Tigers and their partners to the pack." (Coach gives

each boy's and partner's name.)

NARRATOR:

"As Tiger Cubs, you searched, discovered, and share. Now, as Cub Scouts, you will face new challenges, learn new skills, and strive to become good citizens. Yours partners' role will be changing, too, but its importance will not. We ask you partners to continue to support you boy by helping him and our pack, perhaps as a leader."

CUBMASTER:

"Welcome to our pack! Now we ask you to join me in giving the Cub Scout promise. (use repeat after me method: I promise/ To do my best/ To do my duty to God and my country/ To help other people/ And to obey the Law of the Pack.)

"Now partners, we ask you to raise your right hand and repeat the Cub Scout parent's promise. Please repeat after me: "I promise to work with my boy/ and to support him/ as he strives to advance in Cub Scouting. / I will work with him, and I will do my best/ to help the pack grow for all the boys./ I will accept responsibility within

the pack/ to ensure a strong program."

Cubmaster gives the certificates and one - year- pin to partners to present to their boys. Have song leader lead "CUB SCOUT

WELCOME SONG"

#### GRADUATION CEREMONY FOR BOYS TO THEIR NEXT RANK.

EQUIPMENT: Tiger Cubs to Wolf- four candles, three in back one in front.

Wolf to Bear - blue, white, and yellow candles

Bear to Webelos - a door way

all boys should have next rank neckerchief and slide ( put name on a piece

of tape on back of old and new neckerchief)

#### TIGER CUBS TO WOLF:

Will the following Tiger Cubs and their parents please come forward. (read names) For the past few months you and your family have explored all sorts of new and exciting things and places. You have taken each part of the Tiger Cub motto: Search, Discover, and Share and used it in your home, school and neighborhood. (light left candle) you and your adult partner have searched out in your home and community new activities which have shown you how people work together and have fun together.

(light middle candle) You and your adult partner have discovered that by doing things together with friends and family you feel a sense of being part of a great family, community and country. (light right candle) The things you have searched out and discovered have been shared with your family, friends and fellow Tiger Cubs, which let them learn about you and the things you saw and did. Now it is time to move along the Scouting trail to the next part of the program.

(light front candle) In Cub Scouting your family is still important as it is throughout your whole scouting experience. Support in earning each badge comes from your family as well as from your Den Leader. Your parents will help you each step of the way. (read boys and parents names) On behalf of Pack \_\_\_\_, I'd like to welcome you. Parents place the Cub Scout Wolf neckerchief around your son's neck. You are no longer a Tiger Cub you are a Wolf Cubs of Pack \_\_\_\_.

#### WOLF TO BEAR

(blue/white/yellow candles) This is the spirit of scouting. (light white candle) The blue candle represents truth/loyalty. The sky so blue, steadfastness and spirituality (light blue candle) The gold candle represents good cheer and happiness and sunlight so clear (light yellow candle) Will all Wolf Cubs that are moving up to Bear Cubs please join me to the right of the candles. Will all the parents of those Wolf Cubs come forward and stand to the left of the candles.

#### WOLF TO BEAR CON'T

As each Wolf's name is called Cub and parents please step forward in front of the candles. Parents then take off you son's yellow neckerchief and replace it with the blue Bear neckerchief. ( call names Wolf Cub ---- after blue neckerchief call Bear Cub ---- and parents please step back.)

#### **BEAR TO WEBELOS**

Will all the den leaders with Bear Cubs going on to Webelos please escort these Bears and join me this side of the door way to Webelos adventure. Tonight we have some Bear Cubs who have graduated the third grade and will be joining our Webelos Den to prepare them for the adventure of Boy Scouting. Will the Bear Cub parents and the Webelos Leaders please come forward and stand to the left of the door way to adventure. When a boy becomes a Cub Scout he starts on an upward trail. I say "upward" because as he grows older he advances in Cub Scouting.

He does not join a Cub Pack and then waits idly for four years until he becomes a Boy Scout. With the help of his parents and leaders he works and earns the various badges of achievement. Now you can see that these Cub Scouts are on the upward trail. Now that these Cubs are old enough they are moving forward and upward into another phase of Cub Scouting ---- They are becoming Webelos Scouts. My congratulations to you Cub Scouts and your parents for the fine work that you have done in Cub Scouting so far ---- Keep up the good work as Webelos.

(Den Leader explain to boys - how they will remove their neckerchief and slid and send them though the door. Webelos Leader explain to parents how they will place their Webelos neckerchief and slid on their son) (Each Den Leader will escort their advancing Cub Scouts one at a time to the door to adventure. Remove their blue neckerchief. Salute them and let them go through the door as you call out their name. Their Webelos Leader will receive them presented them with their Webelos colors. Their parents will present them with their new neckerchiefs and slide.

#### DEN LEADER RECOGNITION CEREMONY

MATERIALS:

Appreciation certificate (additional token, optional) for each den leader and Webelos den leader.

CUBMASTER: There is something which parents sometimes overlook when they consider the possibility of serving as den and pack leaders. There are two very different types of homes. In one type, everything will always be just so. The furniture is not likely to be marred; there will be little shouting or noise except from the boy who lives in that house; and even shouting will be subdued and experimental. His mother will seldom be troubled by the shouts of other boys, because it is not likely that they will come there. And unless something unusual happens, that is the type of home it will always be. As the children who live in it become young men and women, the rug will never be rolled up for social occasions. They will take their noise and laughter where it is better understood and more welcome.

But there's is another type of home. This type attracts the friends of the children who live in it. They would rather bring their friends there than join them elsewhere. It is a home where children are welcome, where they learn to take care of the furniture rather than preserve it through lack of use. It's a home which later will attract young people.

It's true - the first type of house will be peaceful, because it will be empty. Too empty... too peaceful .... too quiet.

But there are more wonderful things to be sought after in life than peace and quiet. And besides, if you live in the second type of home, it does not mean that all of your own personal comforts and pleasure must be sacrificed. Lasting satisfaction comes from the knowledge that, as each day goes by, you are guaranteeing your children's future memories of their home will be happy ones.

Most den leaders want the second type of home, and they have started to build now, because in a year or two it will be too late. That's why Cub Scouting is not all giving on their part. They'll receive a finer home life and stronger family because of it.

#### (Call forward all den leaders)

These people are making one of the finest possible contributions to our community by serving as den leaders, they not only deal with boys, but with parents, too. They are strengthening the life of our community by enriching the lives of the families who live in it. They are teaching boys to respect their homes and their parents and they are helping parents understand their boys better by doing things with them. Few community services are more important than this.

Please accept these certificates as a small token of our gratitude for your help in Cub Scouting, and the thanks of all the boys you are helping by your service. Thank You.

(Cubmaster gives a certificate to each leader and a Cub Scout handshake, too.)

#### DEN CHIEF RECOGNITION CEREMONY

PERSONNEL:

All den chiefs and Cubmaster.

MATERIALS:

Appreciation certificate for each den chief

CUBMASTER: Cub Scouting is different than Boy Scouting. Like Boy Scouting, it has its games, crafts, advancements, and good will projects. The difference is in the type of activities that boys 7 - 11 years old like to do. The person who knows these activities best is one who has been a Cub Scout.

It is the job of the den chief to help lead den activities that will help these boys to be good Cub Scouts and Webelos Scouts, and eventually good Boy Scouts and Explorers. Den chiefs set a good example by being both a leader and a friend.

Tonight we would like to recognize those who serve our pack as den chiefs.

(Call names and den numbers all den chiefs)

We would like to ask that you re-pledge yourself to your responsibility as den chief. Please repeat the Den Chief's Pledge after me:

I promise to help the Cub Scout in my den. To the best of my ability;

Two 15" sticks or dowels


Four 12" pieces and one 90" piece of hemp twine

Four 12" pieces of bell wire


One 12"×15" piece of thin vinyl

#### **PROCEDURE**

- Bind the four sticks or dowels together with bell wire to form a rectangle. Be sure to make these joints as rigid and tight as possible.
- 2. Cut the piece of vinyl in the shape of a skin, following the pattern in the picture. Punch holes around the edges as indicated.
- 3. Tie the four corners in place with the four 12" pieces of twine. Then lace around the skin with the 90" piece of twine.
- 4. Your badges may be sewn, stapled, or glued to the skin.




#### TEACHING AID FOR POCKET KNIFE SAFETY



Cut "pocketknife" from poster board as shown, using white for blade and another color for the case. Fasten one end with a paper fastener. Be sure holes as as shown on pattern to line up properly when blade is in or out. Blade needs to extend above handle edge, so be sure staples are placed as shown, to stop blade from slipping completely into handle.

TO USE:

Put lipstick on the edge of the blade before using. If lipstick appears anywhere but on the article being "whittled", the whittler has cut himself!




KNIFE SAFETY TIP

KNIFE CARE: A boy needs to know how to open and close if safely, how to sharpen it, how to keep it clean, and how to use it properly.

#### BULB OR BATTERY TESTER

Materials: about 6" of 16-18 gauge wire, flashlight bulb, battery

Make a loop in one end of the wire to wrap around the bulb base. Curve the wire so the other end easily reaches the base of the battery when the bulb is touching the top. Warn boys that the tester should only be used with low voltage bulbs and batteries, never with electric sockets, lamps or appliances.



DEN OPENING: Have Denner conduct roll call with each Cub Scout responding with the name of a carpenter's tool (or plumber's, painter's etc. tools.)

# **AUGUST**

SPLISH, SPLASH!

#### AWARD CEREMONY

You will need two flashlights (one with blue cellophane over the end and the other with gold cellophane over the end, or plastic or tissue paper could be used. A third flashlight will also be needed with red paper over it.)

Cubmaster and two pack leaders will be needed.

CUBMASTER: Here we have the blue light of Cub Scouting on my right (leader stands beside Cubmaster and turns on blue flashlight) and the gold light of Cub Scouting on my left (leader turns on gold light). These two lights symbolize the light of Cub Scouting which can shine brightly in the lives of our boys but only with the help of parents to make them shine. There have been some Cub Scouts in our pack this month who have had those Cub Scouting lights shining in their lives and they've worked hard to pass off some achievements and electives. (Cubmaster need to say appropriate words for awards given.) Would the following Cubs and their parents come forward and stand in the Cub Scouting's Blue and Gold limelight together as we recognize them for the fine work they have done.

Call forth appropriate Cubs and parents and make presentation telling about awards Cubs Earned. After awards given turn off blue and gold lights and turn on red light.

CUBMASTER: We all know that red means stop so let's all stop for a minute every once in a while and ask ourselves if we are really doing the best we can whether as a Cub Scout, a parent, a leader or family member. Parents ask yourself if you've really helped your boy so that Cub Scouting can be a shining light to him. Let's all do our best to keep those Blue and Gold lights shining. (turns off red light and turn on blue and gold lights). Then we can all see out sons step up and receive some of the Blue and Gold limelight for his accomplishments.

Note -- the last part of the ceremony could be worked in as the closing ceremony for the pack meeting.

SETTING AND PROPS: Collect a lot of fishing equipment - tackle box, fancy rod and

reels, lots of plugs, spinners, waders, net, creel, etc.


# ROCK, TREE, AND BRIDGE RACE






#### **PROCEDURE**

#### ADVANCEMENT POSSIBILITY

Webelos Naturalist Activity Badge

#### **MATERIALS**

Three large fruit-juice cans all same-size

1" wide waterproof adhesive tape

Glass jar slightly wider than juice cans

Wire

#### **PROCEDURE**

1. Remove both ends from all three cans.

- Place the cans end-to-end and align the seams. Fasten with wire and 1" wide waterproof adhesive tape.
- 3. Insert this cylinder into a jar and make the joint watertight with waterproof adhesive tape.

By eliminating surface reflections, the waterscope allows you to see directly under water. Be sure you have good footing on the dock, rock ledge, or rowboat before leaning over the water.

NOTE: Carefully check the edge of the can that will be against your face for jagged edges. Use a metal file to make rough edges smooth. For an added precaution, apply duct tape to cover this same edge.

# **NECKERCHIEF SLIDES**

# KINDS OF NECKERCHIEF SLIDES

#### 1. Leather and vinyl

a. Shape: many shapes may be cut from leather and vinyl (Bobcat, Wolf, and Bear faces, arrowhead, basketball, baseball gloves, elephant, owl. Are just a few).

#### 2.Wood

#### a. Shape:

- 1. Circles and ovals may be cut from slices of tree branches.
- 2. Any shape may be cut from thin wood (up to 3/8" plywood or pine).

#### b. Construction:

- 1. Cut out desired shape using coping saw or electric jig saw.
- 2. Staple strip of leather to back side.
- 3. Paint with enamel paint or use permanent markers.
- 4. Adhere stamps and other paper with Mod Podge or use mixture of half water and half white glue; a paint mixture or Mod Podge over stamp to seal and protect against water.

#### 3. Plaster of Paris and resin

a. Shape: You will need a mold. Molds may be found at craft stores, candy and cake decorating suppliers; also use cookie cutters, small containers, bottle caps, and Kool Aid scoops.

#### b. Construction:

- 1. Follow directions on the product you use.
- 2. A pop can ring may serve as a loop. Insert ring into plaster or resin before it hardens.
- 3. NOTE: Do not pour leftover plaster and resin down drains!!
- c. Painting Plaster: Many kinds of paint will soak into it is porous. It helps to seal the plaster with a spray sealer, spray plastic, gesso, or plain latex wall paint. After sealer is dry, any type of paint can be applied tempera, water base paints will usually leave a dull finish. The latter can be given a coat of clear shellac or spray varnish for a shine. Avoid mixing lacquer and enamels the paint will peel.

# 4.Recipes

a. Salt-flour dough- 1/2 cup salt, I cup flour, water; Mix salt and flour together add just

enough water to make a stiff dough; Mix by hand/ knead. Color with tempera paint or food coloring.

b. Flour Clay- 1 cup flour, ½ cup salt, 3 tsp. Alum, water: Add water a little at a time until mixture holds its shape. Food coloring can also be added.

#### 5. Latex Molds

Materials:

Liquid latex mold compound (brand names include: Mold Builder, Mold-It)
Small inexpensive paint brush
Object you want to duplicate
Cheese cloth
Base (plastic or foil covered cardboard or wood)

"Original": The item you want to duplicate! This can be made of wood, plaster, sculpey (bake-in-the-oven clay), plastic, ETC. The mold will have all the details of the original. Look for items that will be thick enough to be sturdy and that have either a "back" or "bottom" that will be open side of the mold (to fill with plaster).

Base: This needs to be larger than your original. The larger the original, the more surrounding area you should have. (A neckerchief slide needs about one inch around it) The easiest "base" is the lid of a coffee can or margarine container. They are moisture proof, reusable, or disposable. You can also cover cardboard or a piece of wood with aluminum foil.

Mounting object: The original must lay as flat as possible on the base and must not move while the mold dries. You can use a bit of rubber cement, glue or (my favorite) double-sided tape to hold the original in place in the center of the base. If an object does not have a flat back you can embed it in plasticine clay and flatten the clay around the slide to create a flat area around the object. If you are making a mold of a plaster slide with a loop back, you can cut a slit in the base to stick the loop through, then put something through the loop to keep it from shifting.

Mold: Follow the directions on the mold compound. You will be brushing multiple coats of latex over the original and extending beyond it in all directions. (This will form a "flange" the will support the mold when casting.) The first coat determines how the mold will turn out. It must be free of bubbles, so carefully brush the latex into all the nooks and crannies. After the first coat is dry, you can add a layer of cheese cloth on top of your next coat then cover it with more latex. This will build up the mold faster. Let this dry. Put it in the sun or under a low-wattage light bulb to help it along. Coat the top as necessary to seal the cheese cloth and to fill holes.

To prepare for use: When the mold is completely dry, peel the mold off the base/original.

You probably will have had some "leakage" around the original. You can turn the mold partially inside-out to trim the thin layer of "extra" (otherwise it can get caught in the plaster and possibly pull your duplicate apart). Use a sharp pair of scissors. It is easier to do if you gently stretch the part to be removed. Trim the extra mold and cheesecloth leaving 3/4" of so around the slide. If you are using a larger object, leave a larger flange.

To mold: Invert mold in glass, mug, bowl, ETC. So that the mold bottom is level. Fill with plaster; allow to set the peel mold off. If you lose the details of the design, it was not dry enough. The plaster needs to stay in the mold longer than in a plastic candy mold. If you have a very complex design and have trouble with air bubbles in the corners, fill the mold with water, and look for bubbles in the mold. Poke them with a toothpick to remove them, then gently pour out the water. When you pour in your plaster, remaining water will be displaced by the plaster and your mold should be bubble free. Doing this makes your plaster "soupier" than unusual so you can mix it a little thicker and definitely let it set longer before unmolding.



Sandpaper



- 1. Cut dowels to length specified.
- 2. Drill 1/4" hole in one end of each 1/2" dowel, slightly off center and about 1/8" deep.
- 3. Drill 1/8" hole (for pipe cleaner) on underside at the same end as 1/4" hole.
- 4. Glue 1/4" dowel in the end holes of the 1/2" dowel.
- 5. Lay the two 1/2" dowels side by side about 1/16" apart with the two end holes to the center.
- 6. Glue 1/8" dowel in place, one end even with the top of the 1/2" dowel.
- 7. Sand and paint black with the lens end white or blue.
- 8. Glue pipe cleaner ends in the two small holes to form slide.

For the mustache, stretch a cotton ball and glue under the nose (can be used as a napkin holder also).



The quiver can be made from a small cylinder of vinyl, cardboard, leather, or a piece of an old plastic toothbrush holder could be used. Paint and decorate as desired. If you wish, the quiver could be covered with felt. Add a shoulder strap, using a piece of cord or narrow felt strip.

Arrows are kitchen matches (heads removed). Tiny bits of real feather fluff could be glued to the ends, or make fringed feather ends from construction paper. Glue inside quiver.

Punch two holes in back side of the quiver. Glue in pipe cleaner for slide ring.



#### Shield Tie Slide

#### Materials:

1-2" - 3" Circle from lightweight wood, cardboard, plastic bottle scrap

Decorations (feathers)

1-.5" x .5" PVC pipe





#### Rawhide

This slide is made from ash twigs that are lashed together as shown. A thin piece of rawhide or vinyl is laced with thin cord to the ash twigs. Any picture that is Indian related would look nice painted on the rawhide. Use a hot glue gun to anchor the twigs together before lashing. Fasten thin wire loops at the top and bottom to use as the loop to hold the neckerchief.



### Fishing Kit

Materials:

1- 35 mm plastic film can 20' good fishing line 2- 34 hooks and 2 lead weights small cardboard and tape A fishing fly or fish stickers



Cut the cardboard to fit the diameter and height of the film can. Cut a curve on each end of the cardboard to aid in holding the fishing line. Prepare the line with a hook and weight. Tape the end of the line to the cardboard loosely so it will not collapse. Secure the sharp end of the hook under the line. Tape the extra hook and weight inside the can. Epoxy a 1/2" x 1/2" piece of PVC pipe to the back of the film can and decorate the can with a fly or fish stickers as desired by the boy. When fishing the can slide serves as a bobber too, when snapped over the line.

Fly Swatter Neckerchief Slide

Cut plastic canvas using the pattern. Cut a piece of floral wire about 6 inches long. Bend the wire in half and twist the open end using pliers. Glue to the back of the plastic canvas with glue gun. Glue a pipe cleaner ring to the back for neckerchief to go through. Make a fly using craft foam and 3 small pieces of wire (beading wire).

Glue fly to front of the plastic canvas to cover wire showing through holes.

# Insect Display Case

Version #1


Use a clear plastic pill bottle with a snap-on lid. Using pliers, hold a nail over a flame on the stove until it is hot. Use the hot nail to punch two holes on one side of plastic bottle, about 1/2" apart. Make a 3-1/2" ring from a pipe cleaner and insert in holes. Twist pipe cleaner on inside to secure it. Then with a hot needle, punch air holes in the lid of the pill bottle. Put in a little bit of sand and a twig. Now you are ready o catch a creepy, crawling specimen to put inside your display case. This is a really unique slide. You can change the contents of your display case whenever you wish.

# RECYCLING

Juice Can Tie Slide

Materials:

Juice can (5.5 oz best size) 12" leather lace (or substitute) Pony beads



Crush can using a can crusher. File any sharp edges away. Punch 2 holes in bottom of can. Thread leather strand through holes and out front. Leave loop in back for neckerchief to run through and tie off in the front. Add beads to the strands.

#### Litter Basket

#### Version #1


Use a clear plastic 1 oz. Cup. Make holes for a pipe cleaner ring on the back with a hot nail or needle. Use a fine tipped marking pen to make crosses on inside of cup. Make a little sign with paper to glue on front. Fill basket with wadded paper scraps.

You can also make a litter basket slide using the small plastic "JET DRY" baskets from the

dishwasher.

#### Version #2

This slide is made from a plastic cup. The cup is jigger size. The bottom is cut out just large enough to let a neckerchief slip through but small enough so that the slide doesn't slip off. Cover the cup with aluminum foil. Take a small piece of wire and attach to rim for handle.





### Version #3

This wastepaper neckerchief slide is made from a jigger size plastic cup. The bottom is removed to let the neckerchief slide through. Cover the cup with gray paper and print "EVERY LITTER BIT HURTS YOU" on front.

# SEA / WATER

#### Life Preserver

On a piece of Styrofoam about 1/2" thick, draw a 3" circle and cut out. From the center of the circle, remove a 2" circle. Loosely wrap cord around edge of Styrofoam and bind in place, as shown, with red cloth tape. Print "Cub Scout" on one side and "Pack No. \_\_\_\_" on the other. Insert and glue ends of a piece of white chenille into back for ring.

#### Octopus Tie Slide

#### Materials:

Half walnut shell
2 wiggle eyes

4 black or gray pipe cleaners Plaster of Paris or hydrocal

Glue

1 Plastic curtain ring or soda can ring



- 2. Cut 4 pipe cleaners in half. Bend the ends and insert them into the plaster around the edges.
- 3. When dry, paint the nut shell black for the body.
- 4. Glue on the eyes and bend and roll ends of the "legs".
- 5. Reinforce the pipe cleaners with glue where wires go into plaster.

#### Plaster Slides

Pour plaster as specified on the package into candy molds. Add ring immediately. Using a wet mold will make the slide easier to remove from the mold. Spray plaster with a sealant before painting to keep the paint from soaking in.

Sea Serpent Tie Slide or can be used as Snake Materials:

2 pipe cleaners

String

Dowel or pencil or something round

- 1. Twist the ends of two pipe cleaners together.
- 2. Double one end back to shape head.
- 3. Add a string tongue.
- 4. Wrap remainder around and turn end up for a tail.

#### Version #2

- 2- 1/2 piece of pipe cleaner
- 1" piece of pipe cleaner
- 1- 1/2 craft stick
- 1. Remove wire snap.

# Reversible Placemat





## Supplies needed:

Fronts of old cards (Christmas, birthday, all occasion)
Wrapping paper Gold bric-a-brac (or any color you choose)
Glue or glue gun
Clear contact paper - 18" wide

## **Instructions:**

- 1. Cut one sheet of wrapping paper suggested size: 12" x 18". This will be the back of the placemat.
- 2. Trim fronts of cards.
- 3. Lay wrapping paper face down on a flat surface.
- 4. Arrange cards on reverse side of wrapping paper, overlapping them in a random pattern, being sure to cover the entire sheet.
- 5. When you have arranged the cards the way you like them, glue them in place and allow to dry. This is now the front side of the placemat.
- 6. Glue bric-a-brac around the outside edges of the front of the placemat and allow to dry.
- 7. Cut two pieces of clear contact paper, each bigger (at least 1/2") than the wrapping paper on all sides.
- 8. Place the back side of the placemat to the sticky side of the contact paper. Be sure to smooth out all bubbles.
- 9 Place the front side of the placemat to the sticky side of the other piece of contact paper.
- 10. Tightly press all edges of the contact paper together to seal the placemat.
- 11. Trim edges of contact paper allowing a 1/4" margin around the finished size of placemat.


You're done! Your placemat is easy to wipe off with a wet cloth.

## Some variations:

- Have your child draw a picture or write his/her name on a large sheet of paper instead of using wrapping paper.
- 2. Use a favorite picture from a magazine or poster.
- 3. Substitute photographs instead of cards.

# Kid's Christmas Bells





These Christmas bells are so easy to make and so much fun!
Kids will have a great time making decorations for themselves or as gifts!

## SUPPLIES NEEDED

3 styrofoam or paper cups (any size, preferably small)
aluminum foil
3 small bells
Any color ribbon (crinkled gift wrapping ribbon is the easiest to work with)
Pencil (or other sharp object to poke a hole)

## **INSTRUCTIONS:**

Wrap each cup in aluminum foil, covering the entire outside and as much of the inside as possible.

With a pencil or other sharp object, poke a hole in the center of the bottom of each foil-covered cup. The hole should be big enough to insert the ribbon through the hole, but small enough so that the bells won't slip through it.

3. Cut a piece of ribbon long enough to tie a bow at the top with enough ribbon left over to make two tails. (Ribbon #1).

4. Cut three more pieces of ribbon in different lengths so that the bells will hang to different lengths.

5. Tie one end of Ribbon #2 to the center of ribbon #1.

6 Repeat Step 5 with Ribbons #3 and #4.

7. Tie Ribbon #1 into a bow, using the center where all the ribbons join as the center of the bow.

8. Trim the ends of Ribbon #1 into a "V" shape by folding the ribbon in half at the end, then cutting a small triangle off the end, starting at a corner. (If you prefer, you can just snip off the end on a diagonal cut without folding.)

9 Thread the untied end of Ribbon #2 through the hole in one of the cups.

10. Continue threading Ribbon #2 through one of the bells and tie a knot.

11. Repeat Steps 9 and 10 with Ribbons #3 and #4 and the remaining cups.

# "Stained Glass" Candle Holders

Crafters of all ages can create a lovely, unique finished product within a half hour. It makes a wonderful gift!

## Materials:

- Clear glass container (jar, small glass)
- Tissue paper in assorted colors
- LINIT® Liquid Starch
- Paint Brush
- · Votive or tea candle, depending on size of container

## **Process:**

- 1. Tear the tissue paper and/or pictures into small (1") pieces.
- 2. Paint the container with undiluted LINIT® Liquid Starch.
- 3. Apply the tissue paper to the container with your fingers, overlapping to create different colored effects.
- 4. Once the container is covered, apply a coat of LINIT® Liquid Starch over all the pieces.
- 5. Allow the container to dry overnight on an aluminum covered tray.
- 6. Place the candle in the container.

[TIP: Try using red, green, and gold tissue paper for Christmas candle holders. Group several on your mantel or table centerpiece for a fabulous, festive look.]

## Yarn Net Molds

There are many projects you can make for every season. These mold nets can be used as holiday ornaments, window decorations, centerpieces, and more.

Small, delicate net molds, strung with ribbons or yarn, can be used for Christmans tree decorations.

At Easter, using pastel colored yarn and small, oval-shaped balloons, you can create eggs forhanging or eggs for arrangement in a bowl or basket for use as a centerpiece. For a spring decoration, use brown twine and cover half of a round balloon, making a small twine nest. Fill the nest with tiny robin's eggs, little silk flowers or a feathercraft bird.

In autumn, fill your nest with colored leaves, nuts, or little plastic mushrooms. Hang multicolored balls of color in a sunny window all year 'round.

Since the wet yearn and balloons are slippery to handle, this project is recommended for older children with a bit more patience and dexterity than the younger ones have. Working in pairs would be helpful

## Materials:

- Small balloons
- Petroleum jelly
- Yarn or string (Choose color(s) appropriate to your project.)
- LINIT® Liquid Starch in a bowl
- Wax paper

## **Process:**

- 1. Blow up the balloons to the desired size and knot the ends.
- 2. Coat the inflated balloon with a thin layer of petroleum jelly.
- 3. Cut the yarn into long pieces (approximately 2-3 ft.) and dip them into starch.
- 4. Starting at the knotted and, begin wrapping the starch-soaked yarn around the balloon at various angles. Remeber that the idea is to create a net, so don't leave any big gaps.
- 5. Set the balloon on wax paper to dry.
- 6. When the yarn is completely dry (several hours or overnight) carefully pop the balloon and remove it.

## Play Putty/Slime

It's fun for kids to play with, however, it can be a little messy. Cover your work surface with newspaper.

## Materials:

- 2 cups LINIT ® Liquid Starch
- 2 cups white glue
- Food coloring

IMPORTANT: Because play putty/slime can be broken into small pieces and may present a choking hazard, this is not suitable for children under five years of age.

## Process:

Add a few drops of food coloring to white glue. Stir in LINIT® Liquid Starch, small amounts at a time.

Keep stirring until the mixture is smooth and rubber like. The dough should move away from the sides of the bowl and be sticky to touch.

Add a few more drops of starch to eliminate the sticky feel. It can be stored in an airtight container and refrigerated over night.

## **Making Paper**

In today's society, people are always looking for ways to recycle. This is a fun activity that recycles paper - you can make new paper from used paper.

## Materials:

- 10 sheets of newspaper
- A large pot
- 2 cups water
- A blender (or an egg beater)
- A deep pan, a little larger in area than the screen
- 2 tablespoons of LINIT® Liquid Starch
- A piece of screen (about 5 inches by 10 inches)
- Additional pieces of newspaper for blotting
- A round jar or rolling pin

## Process:

Tear the 10 sheets of newspaper into very small pieces. Place them in a large pot.

Pour in the water and let the mixture sit for a few hours, until the paper is soggy.

Blend the water and the soggy paper in the blender in small amounts, or mix them thoroughly with the egg beater or spoon. The mixture should have the consistency of oatmeal.

Pour the mixture into the pan and add LINIT® Liquid Starch. Stir for about 3 minutes.

Slide the screen under the pulp. Move the screen around until the pulp covers half of the screen. You can also spread handfuls of pulp on the screen. The pulp should be about 1/8 inch (3 mm) thick.

Lift the screen out carefully. Hold it level and let it drain for about one minute.

Fold the other half of the screen over the pulp and place it on several layers of newspaper. Put more newspaper on the top.

Roll the rolling pin or the jar over the newspaper "sandwich" to squeeze out the rest of the water.

Take off the top newspaper. Remove the pulp from the folded screen. It will be your paper!

Allow the recycled paper to dry overnight before you write on it.

# **Molded Paper Sculptures**

Instead of rolling the paper pulp described above into sheets, you can pack the pulp into clear candy molds of all shapes and sizes. Press the pulp deep into all areas of the mold. (The clear mold will enable you to see it easily.) Use a sponge to soak up extra moisture, then use a towel or paper towel and press firmly to remove as much water as possible. Let the pulp dry in the mold overnight. When the paper pulp is dry, press on the edges of the mold and push the paper sculpture out. You can leave the rough edges around the image for a handcrafted look or trim the edges with scissors. Your new sculpture may then be painted, decorated with ribbons, mounted and framed, or become part of a collage.

## Marbling

Marbling is a craft that is immediately gratifying. The freeform patterns and lovely colors that occur in marbling are dazzling. Traditionally found inside books to cover the binding, marbled paper can be used to make book covers, cards and add special charm to collages.

## Materials:

- LINIT® Liquid Starch (64 oz.)
- Tempera or acrylic paint
- Acrylic flow improver or liquid soap
- 9" by 12" tray or aluminum pan
- Eye dropper, comb, toothpicks
- Paper

Thin paint with water to the consistency of heavy cream. (Paints can be put in a muffin tin, baby food jars or other small containers.)

Add a few drops of acrylic flow improver to each color. (This is a spreading agent.) Or you can use liquid soap, however, use only a tiny amount to prevent bubbles.

Pour LINIT® Liquid Starch into tray.

Using an eye dropper, drip paint close to the surface of the liquid starch, being careful not to use too much. Experiment with different colors.

Use a comb or toothpick to gently pull the paint across the surface and create a design. Do not overwork the paint, as you may lose the marbling effect.

Hold the paper on diagonal corners. Bend it slightly so that the middle touches the surface of the paint and starch. Then slowly drop the paper.

Pick up the same corners and lift the paper straight up. Turn over and rinse off the excess starch in the sink. The marbled pattern will not disappear.

Allow to dry.			

## Stick Puppets

Puppets are a wonderful tool for dramatization as well as language development. Children as young as five can make simple stick puppets. According to their stages of development they can elaborate on the basic puppet. Older children can make shadow or jointed puppets.

## Materials:

- Cardboard (shirt boards, cut up cartons, etc.)
- Collage materials (fabric, yarn, buttons)
- LINIT® Liquid Starch Paste (see recipe on "Arts & Crafts Ideas" page)
- Sticks
- Scissors

### Process:

- 1. Cut cardboard into various sizes and shapes. Large rectangles for bodies, smaller rectangles for heads and long narrow rectangles for legs, arms and tails
- 2. Arrange the shapes to form an animal or person and paste shapes together.
- 3. Attach a stick to the base (body) of the puppet. Further secure with a piece of tape
- 4. Decorate puppet with collage materials on both sides. (You can make the puppet different on

## Papier-Mâché Puppets

## Materials:

Newspaper

• LINIT® Liquid Starch Paste (see recipe on the "Arts & Crafts Ideas" page)

Toilet paper rolls

• Felt, yarn, plastic doll eyes, scraps of material

• Tissue Paper (assorted colors)

#### Process:

- 1. To make the puppet head, crumple up a sheet of newspaper and shape with hands to form ball.
- 2. Wrap ball in another sheet, gathering all ends into your hand at the bottom. Twist.
- 3. Insert head into toilet paper roll.
- 4. Follow steps for papier-mâché to complete the head. (Arts & Crafis page).
- 5. When the head is completely dry, make puppet body out of cloth. For younger children, provide a paper pattern they can use to trace. Older children can create their own pattern.
- 6. Cut out a front piece and a back piece.
- 7. Sew or glue underarm and side seams.
- 8. Add felt hands.
- 9. An alternative body could be made from an old sock.
- 10. Paint a face and decorate with yarn for hair.

# Chinese "Rice Paper" Pictures


This is a great way to create semi-transparent paper artwork. Before beginning, determine if you want to make a representational image or an abstract design. You might want to cut out your shapes in advance. And remember, some overlapping colors look nice, too.

## Materials:

- 2 same size sheets of white tissue paper (aka art tissue) per picture
- Assorted pieces of colored tissue paper
- Wax Paper
- LINIT® Liquid Starch

## **Process:**

- 1. Place wax paper on the worktable.
- 2. Place a sheet of white tissue paper on the wax paper.
- 3. Brush a thin coat of starch on the tissue paper.
- 4. Arrange your various shapes of colored tissue paper on the white tissue paper.
- 5. Place another sheet of white tissue paper on top of the colored, creating a sandwich effect.
- 6. Coat again with the LINIT® Liquid Starch. Let it dry.
- 7. Peel the tissue away from the wax paper and you will have a beautiful "rice" paper image



## Supplies:

white spray paint red nail polish black permanent marker glue gun or model cement

## Instructions:

Set wood ball on one end of body (rigatoni) and glue.

Glue hair (salad macaroni) to ball.

Glue hem (star macaroni) along the bottom of body

Glue wings (farfalle pasta) to back of body.

Glue arms (elbow macaroni) to front of body to hold candle.

Glue candle and holder (tack) to point where arms meet.

Spray paint entire angel white and allow to dry.


Paint tip of candle red with nail polish.

## **MATERIALS**

Two 1" hinges with screws

Two small screw-eyes

12" plumber's chain or wire

Reflector tape or glass reflectors

Screwdriver

Hammer


Two boards 4" x 24" x 3/4"

Sandpaper

## **PROCEDURE**


- 1. Cut the boards to right lengths and sand edges smooth.
- 2. Nail the reflectors to one side of each board or apply reflector tape in several strips on each board.
- 3. Using a screwdriver, screw the hinges to the top of both boards.
- 4. Measure 8" from the bottom of each board and then screw in a screw-eye at that point. Attach the plumber's chain or wire between the eyes.

If your car breaks down at night, place the emergency signal on the highway a reasonable distance in back of the car.
